

Spend a day soaking in the sun at Bentota Beach, visit the nearby Kosgoda Turtle Hatchery, or find peace in the Galapatha Raja Maha Vihara Buddhist temple. Bentota is a tourist hot spot, so you'll also be able to partake in activities like helicopter rides and water sports.
- 5. Kandy is located on a plateau that is surrounded by the central highland mountains. Kandy, a World Heritage Site, is the place to go to get a taste of Sinhalese culture. Visit the Temple of the Tooth, which was built in the 4th century and holds a very sacred relic Buddha's tooth.

"Women to be inducted in Army by 2021: In a transformational move, the Indian Army is all set to commission the first batch of 100 women soldiers. According to reports, the batch will be commissioned by March 2021. The women soldiers will be commissioned into the Corps of Military

Police of the Indian Army. "The training period - of 61 weeks - is similar to that of male soldiers. Currently, women are allowed in a number of select areas including in medical, legal, educational, signals and engineering wings of the Army but combat roles are kept off limit for them due to operational concerns and logistical issues.



DRDO successfully conducts Agni II missile's night trial for first time: India on November 16 conducted successfully the first night trial of Agni-II, its versatile surface-to-surface medium range nuclear-capable missile from Dr. Abdul Kalam Island off Odisha, defence sources said.

The missile has a strike range of 2000 km, the sources said soon after it blasted off from a mobile launcher at the Launch Complex-4 of the Integrated Test Range (ITR), the sources said.Agni-II, an intermediate range ballistic missile (IRBM), has already been inducted into the armed forces.




