

8. In Cyprus, there are some cafes that are only for men.



BLACK HOLES AND THEIR MYSTERY



10th April 2019 marked a new era in astronomical discoveries as the first ever image of the black hole was released by astronomers. The photo was mad e possible by the event horizon telescope which combined 8 telescopes strategically placed at different points to create an earth sized telescope. They simultaneously observed variations around the black hole for about 10 days. The satellites collected so much data that that it could not be transmitted over the internet. Instead hard drives had to be flown in to four teams of scientists who analyzed the data to build the image. The picture itself shows one of the largest black holes in the universe located at the centre of the M87 galaxy located about 50 million light years from earth. The black, perfectly circular region in the centre is what is termed as the point of no return beyond which nothing even light or matter can escape its gravitational field. The orange circular 'ring of fire' as coined by professor Kalke, one of the leading astronomers behind the gargantuan project, has not been fully understood as of now but astronomers suppose it is dust that has been heated to millions of degrees by

intense friction due to the gravitational pull.

The black hole, now named Sagittarius A* and the photograph marks an embarkment into a new era full of possibilities and untold discoveries. What's next? No one knows. All that can be assured is that space will never be seen in the same way again. Ever

INTRESTING FACTS

Since the black hole is so far away, light that reached the telescope from it actually started its journey 55 million years ago. To put into perspective, dinosaurs went extinct 65 million years ago

In Einstein's theory of relativity, he described that the black hole was invisible but could be seen if it was placed against a bright plane. The photo hence confirms that the theoretical image and actual image almost coincides.

C.V. RAMAN BIOGRAPHY



Born: November 7, 1888 Died: November 21, 1970 Achievements: He was the first Indian scholar who studied wholly in India received the Nobel Prize.

C.V. Raman is one of the most renowned scientists produced by India. His full name was Chandrasekhara Venkata Raman. For his pioneering work on scattering of light, C.V. Raman won the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1930.

DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICS

Chandrashekhara Venkata Raman was born on November 7, 1888 in Tiruchinapalli, Tamil Nadu. He was the second child of Chandrasekhar Iyer and Parvathi Amma. His father was a lecturer in mathematics and physics, so he had an academic atmosphere at home. He entered Presidency College, Madras, in 1902, and in 1904 passed his B.A. examination, winning the first place and the gold medal in physics. In 1907, C.V. Raman passed his M.A. obtaining distinction.

In 1917, Raman was offered the position of Sir Taraknath Palit Professorship of Physics at Calcutta University. He stayed there for the next fifteen years. During his tenure there, he received world wide recognition for his work in optics and scattering of light. He was elected to the Royal Society of London in 1924 and the British made him a knight of the British Empire in 1929. In 1930, Sir C.V. Raman was awarded with Nobel Prize in Physics for his work on scattering of light. The discovery was later known as "Raman Effect".

In 1934, C.V. Raman became the director of the newly established Indian Institute of Sciences in Bangalore, where two years later he continued as a professor of physics. Other investigations carried out by Raman were: his experimental and theoretical studies on the diffraction of light by acoustic waves of ultrasonic and hypersonic frequencies (published 1934-1942), and those on the effects produced by X-rays on infrared vibrations in crystals exposed to ordinary light. In 1947, he was appointed as the first National Professor by the new government of Independent India. He retired from the Indian Institute in 1948 and a year later he established the Raman Research Institute in Bangalore, where he worked till his death.

Sir C.V. Raman died on November 21, 1970.

ICSK ORGANIZES ORIENTATION PROGRAMME FOR CLASS 7



who scored 499 out of a possible 500 - were also girls, both from Uttar Pradesh.









Epitome of Success

Leonardo da Vinci

Leonardo di ser Piero da Vinci, more commonly as Leonardo da Vinci, was an Italian polymath of the Renaissance whose areas of interest included invention, drawing, painting, sculpting, architecture, science, music, mathematics, engineering, literature, anatomy, geology, astronomy, botany, writing, history, and cartography. He has been variously called the father of palaeontology, ichnology, and architecture, and he is widely considered one of the greatest painters of all time. Sometimes credited with the inventions of the parachute, helicopter, and tank, he epitomised the Renaissance humanist ideal. Leonardo was born on 15 April 1452 "at the third hour of the night" in the Tuscan hill town of Vinci, in the lower valley of the Arno river in the territory of the Medici-ruled Republic of Florence.

Within Leonardo's lifetime, his extraordinary powers of invention, his "outstanding physical beauty", "infinite grace", "great strength and generosity", "regal spirit and tremendous breadth of mind", as described by Vasari, as well as all other aspects of his life, attracted the curiosity of others. One such aspect was his respect for life, evidenced by his vegetarianism and his habit, according to Vasari, of purchasing caged birds and releasing them.

Leonardo received an informal education in Latin, geometry and mathematics. In later life, Leonardo recorded only two childhood incidents. One, which he regarded as an omen, was when a kite dropped from the sky and hovered over his cradle, its tail feathers brushing his face. The second occurred while he was exploring in the mountains: he discovered a cave and was both terrified that some great monster might lurk there and driven by curiosity to find out what was inside.
