



PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Children,

I know that after the second mid term examination, you are waiting for to welcome the new year 2018. Let us look forward with positivity and enthusiasm and wish that the coming year brings peace, harmony, happiness, and wealth.

Did you ever wish that you could manage people with your mind? It is easy, for that learn these psychological tricks - you'll be amazed at how simple it is.

1. Agreeableness

When you ask someone a question, get them to agree with you by simply nodding your head. This action makes them start thinking that what you're saying is true and that they should nod "yes" too, since we're social creatures.

2. Word Conditioning

When having a conversation with someone, pick a word they say and then whenever they say that word, or similar words, just smile, nod, or give them some kind of positive affirmation. Watch in amusement as they start saying that word all the time.

3. The Zeigarnik Effect

Got a song stuck in your head? Think (or sing) the last verse of the song. Our mind tends to continue thinking about unfinished tasks, this is known as the Zeigarnik Effect. By thinking about the end of the song, you signal your brain that the task is finished.

4. How to Build Attraction

When you first meet someone, if you're going for a handshake you better make sure your hand is warm. A warm handshake is more inviting than a cold one. You should also subtly mimic the other person's posture and actions, as it builds trust and makes you seem the both of you fit well together.

5. Getting Information

Want your friend to open up? Ask him or her a question, keep eye contact and remain silent for a few seconds. They will compelled to continue talking, albeit possibly more irritated, but talk they will.

6 Confrontation

If you think someone is going to confront you in a meeting, sit right next to them. It is an awkward thing to talk ill of someone or to be aggressive towards them when they're up close. No one wants to sit next to someone they just bad-mouthed – take advantage of it.

10. Start with a request they can't refuse and work your way up.

Instead of starting with a large request, you start with something really small. Once someone has committed to helping you, or agreeing to something, they are now more likely to agree to a bigger request.

11. Paraphrase people and repeat back to them what they just said.

One of the most positive ways to influence others is to show them that you really understand how they feel, that you have real empathy for them. One of the most effective ways to do this is by paraphrasing what they say and repeating it back to them, also known as reflective listening.

Fantabulous CHILDREN'S DAY Celebrations On November 14





Christmas is an ancient celebration, heaped in literally centuries of tradition. But some of our seasonal favorites have surprising origins. Read on, and have a happy holiday season!

- It wasn't always on December 25. Though Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ, there is no mention of December 25 in the Bible. (Most historians believe he was actually born in the spring.) It wasn't chosen as the official holiday until the 3rd Century. Some argue that the date was picked because it coincided with the pagan festival of Saturnalia, celebrating agricultural god Saturn with partying and gift-giving.
- 2. Thank Prince Albert for your tree. Another Christmas tradition stemming from Saturnalia was the Christmas tree: During the winter solstice, branches served as a reminder of spring and became the root of our Christmas tree. The Germans are credited with first bringing evergreens into their homes and decorating them, a tradition which made it's way to the United States in the 1830s. But it wasn't until Germany's Prince Albert introduced the tree to his new wife, England's Queen Victoria, that the tradition took off. The couple were sketched in front of a Christmas tree in 1848 and royal fever did its work.
- Coca-Cola came up with the red suit. Well, Santa wore a variety of colourful suits through the years - including red, blue, white, and green - but legend has it that the popular image of his red coat came from a 1930s ad by Coca Cola.
- 4. St. Nick was more generous than jolly. Sure, you probably knew that Santa Claus came from St. Nicholas, a Christian bishop living in the fourth century AD. St. Nicholas gave away his abundant inheritance to help the needy. He also was known for good deeds like rescuing sisters from prostitution. As his legend spread, he was eventually known by names like as Sinter Klaas in Dutch which morphed into Santa Claus. He's not just the protector of children, either: St. Nicholas is also the patron saint of unmarried women, prisoners, thieves and pawnbrokers. How's that for a naughty list?
- Stockings have a funny root. According to legend, hanging stockings came from the take of a poor man who couldn't afford his three daughters dowries: St. Nick dropped a bag of gold

- 6. Rudolph was almost named Reginald. A copywriter named Robert L. May first invented the oddball reindeer in 1939 as a marketing gimmick for Montgomery Ward's holiday coloring books. (May considered naming the beloved misfit Reginald and Rollo.) And his nose wasn't originally going to be red: A red nose was viewed as a sign of sign of chronic alcoholism, and Montgomery Ward didn't want him to seem like a drunkard. Good thing they changed it. "Reginald, the blue-nosed reindeer" doesn't have quite the same ring ... or charm.
- 7. Jingle Bells was originally a Thanksgiving song. James Lord Pierpont, an organist from Savannah, Georgia, first performed a song he wrote, "The One Horse Open Sleigh," at his church's Thanksgiving concert. The song was re-published in 1857 and given the title of today. Bonus fact: It's also the first song broadcast from space. On December 16, 1965, the Gemini 6 crew serenaded Mission Control after they reported seeing a "redsuited" astronaut.
- 8. All letters addressed to Santa in the United States go to Santa Claus, Indiana
- 9. A large part of Sweden's population watches Donald Duck cartoons every Christmas Eve since 1960.
- 10. In 1918 and for the past 40 years, the Canadian province of Nova Scotia has sent the city of Boston a giant Christmas tree as a thank you for their support after the 1917 Halifax explosion.
- 11. The traditional three colors of Christmas are green, red, and gold. Green has long been a symbol of life and rebirth; red symbolizes the blood of Christ, and gold represents light as well as wealth and royalty.
- 12. President Teddy Roosevelt, an environmentalist, banned Christmas trees from the White House in 1901.
- 13. Each year there are approximately 20,000 "rent-a-Santas" across the United States.





ICSK HOSTS Dr. THOMAS IDICULLA TO HEADLINE ADOLESCENT CAMPUS CONFERENCE



"Adolescence represents an inner emotional upheaval, a struggle between the eternal human wish to cling to the past and the equally powerful wish to get on with the future." It is quite true that adolescence is the pivotal phase in any human's development and growth. It is the crucial transitional period from childhood into adulthood. Crucial physical, emotional, mental, and attitudinal changes take place during this period. To equip the students to deal with this challenging period in an individual's life, The Indian Community School (Senior) Kuwait, organized a seminar on 'CHALLENGES FACED BY ADOLESCENTS' on 16th November 2017 in the school auditorium. Dr.Thomas Idiculla, Director, Mental Health Evaluation Dept & e BASIS, McLean Hospital who is an Instructor in Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, Greater Boston Area Hospital & Health Care conducted the session.

The speaker urged the students to stay away from distractions while studying and gave them tips to train their minds to concentrate. The lively questionnaire session paved the path to realistic solutions by Dr. Thomas Idiculla. Principal Dr. V.Binumon thanked Dr. Thomas for his visit to the school and for his inspiring session conducted to motivate the students of school by empowering them to face life's challenges head on.

THE WORLD'S MOST MYSTERIOUS BOOK



Deep inside Yale University's Beinecke rare book and manuscript library lies the only copy of the only copy of a 240-page tome. Recently carbon dated to around 1420, its vellum pages feature looping handwriting and hand drawn images seemingly stolen from a dream. Real and imaginary plants, floating castles, astrology diagrams, zodiac rings, and suns and moons with faces that accompany the text.

This 24X16 cm book is called The Voynich Manuscript and it is one of history's biggest unsolved mysteries. The reason why? No one can figure out what it says.

The name comes from Wilfred Voynich, a Polish bookseller who came across the document at a Jesuit college in Italy in 1912. He was puzzled. Who wrote it? Where was it made? What do these bizarre words and vibrant drawings represent? What secrets do its pages contain? He purchased the manuscript from the cash-strapped priest

at the college and eventually brought it o the USA where experts have continued to puzzle over it for more than a century.

Cryptologists say that the writing has all the characteristics of a real language, just one that no one's ever seen before. The manuscript is highly decorated throughout the scroll-like embellishments.



Over the years, three main theories about the manuscript's text have emerged. The first is that it is written in cipher-a secret code deliberately designed to hide its meaning. The second is that the document is a hoax written in gibberish to make money off a gullible buyer. Some speculate, the author was a medieval con man. Others, that it was Voynich himself. The theory is that the manuscript is written in an actual language, but in an unknown script. Perhaps, medieval scholars were attempting to create an alphabet for a language that was spoken bur not yet written.

Though no one can read the Voynich manuscript, that hasn't sopped people from guessing what it might say. Those who believe the manuscript was an attempt to create a new form of encyclopedia containing the knowledge of the culture that produced it.

After 100 years of frustration, scientists have recently shed a little light on the mystery. The first breakthrough was the carbon dating. Also, contemporary historians have traced the provenance of the manuscript back through Rome and Prague to as early as 1612.

In addition to these historical breakthroughs, linguistic researchers recently proposed the provisional identification of a few of the manuscript words. If we can crack its code, what might we find? A dream-journal of a 15th century illustrator? A bunch of nonsense? Or the lost knowledge of a forgotten culture? What are your guesses?

KNOW THE SIGNS OF EARTHQUAKE: WORKSHOP ON EARTHQUAKE DISASTER MANAGEMENT



The recent earthquake at the Iraq-Iran border shows that earthquake is a hazard beyond human control and the only way to reduce the risk is increasing the capacity of individuals or communities to reduce the impact during an earthquake, which comes through awareness and preparedness that is the need of the hour and prompted the training and awareness session for the students of ICSK Senior on 15th November 2017.

Around 2000 students of the school attended this informative session which was conducted by Mr.Joel D'souza, Senior PGT-Department of Geography to enlighten the students about the consequences of earthquakes and proper behaviour, response and rescue methods during and after earthquake disaster.

ASTRONOMICAL FACTS

- You are as old as the universe, since matter can neither be created nor destroyed.
- Earth is the only planet that has plate tectonics.
- Every atom present in the universe was either a part of a star or become in the future.
- Space is not vacuum completely; there are about three atoms per cubic meter of space.
- Only 5% of the universe is made up of normal matter, 25% is dark matter and 70% is dark energy.
- Neutron stars are the leftovers of the deaths of massive stars in supernova explosions.

- The Crab Nebula was produced by a supernova explosion that appeared in our skies in the year 1054 A.D. The Chinese and Arab astronomers at the time noted that the explosion was so bright that it was visible during the day, and it lit up the night sky for months.
- Venus is considerably hotter than Mercury, even though it is farther away from the Sun.
- Space isn't completely empty.
- The universe is filled with galaxies and the most distant ones are moving away from us at more than 90 percent of the speed of light.

The session began with the basic premise that disaster management is vital because human life is precious. The speaker imparted the information about the seismic zones of India and the level of risk involved in each of them. Similarly, he drew the attention towards Kuwait's vulnerability to earthquake due to tectonic plate and oil extraction. Damages would be substantial even in low-intensity earthquake owing to the nature of soil and housing technology.

The students learnt how to recognize an earthquake, immediate safety measures to be taken and the long-term measures of building technology that withstands earthquakes, how to 'earthquake-proof the homes, what emergency supplies and equipment to be taken, planning before earthquakes, response during an earthquake and what not to do during an earthquake. The speaker emphasized the need for presence of mind in the event of earthquake. The disaster management, in the event of earthquake, was elucidated in the context of mitigation, preparedness, response and relief-rehabilitation.

Queen, Prince mark 70th wedding anniversary: Britain's Queen Elizabeth II marked her 70th wedding anniversary with the release of a new portrait of herself with husband Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh.



'Teias world-class fighter jet, plays defined role': The indigenously developed Tejas Light Combat Aircraft is a world class fighter jet and can effectively play its "defined" role in securing Indian skies, its manufacturer Hindustan Aeronautics Ltd

(HAL) said as the Indian Air Force looked at acquiring a fleet of foreign single-engine jets.



India unlikely to cut malaria by half in 2020 WHO: India accounted for 6% of global malaria cases and 7% of deaths caused by it in 2016, according to a report released by the World Health Organisation (WHO). WHO figures also suggest that India

is unlikely to reduce its case burden beyond 40% by 2020. In contrast, Maldives, Sri Lanka and Kyrgyzstan achieved malaria-free status in 2015 and 2016 respectively.



ISRO opens doors to private sector: In an attempt to increase the number of satellite launches and build the capacity of the private sector, the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) issued a tender on Monday to the private industry for

Assembly, Integration and Testing (AIT) of 30-35 satellites.



Manmohan wins Indira Gandhi Prize: Former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh will be the recipient of this year's Indira Gandhi Prize for Peace, Disarmament and Development. The award, comprising a cash prize of ₹25 lakh and a citation,

was instituted by the Indira Gandhi Memorial trust in 1986. A jury headed by former President Pranab Mukherjee made the decision on the award given out annually to individuals and organisations in recognition of creative efforts toward promoting international peace, development and a new international economic order, ensuring that scientific discoveries are used for the larger good of humanity, and enlarging the scope of freedom.



President calls for time-bound plan to reduce crop wastage: The President of India, Ram Nath Kovind, called for a timebound plan to reduce, if not eliminate, crop wastage in India. Terming the crop wastage in the country as "unacceptably high," the

President said, "... some of the numbers (on crop wastage) are truly startling." Speaking at the concluding function of World Food India (WFI) 2017, Mr. Kovind said, Delegates from over 60 countries, including CEOs of 60 global companies, attended the WFI event. Mr. Kovind called the event "the Kumbh Mela of Indian food," as it "helped showcase the vast and near limitless opportunities in the food industry and in food processing in India."



Israel honors Natalie Portman with 'Jewish Nobel Prize': Natalie Portman has been awarded Israel's 2018 Genesis Prize in recognition of her commitment to social causes and deep connection to her Jewish and Israeli roots, organizers of the

prize announced. The \$1 million award, known as "the Jewish Nobel Prize," is granted each year to a person recognised as an inspiration to the next generation of Jews through professional achievement and commitment to Jewish values.



Maggi makers Nestle, distributors fined ₹62 lakh in U.P.: Multinational giant Nestle is under the scanner once again as it has been fined ₹45 lakh after samples of its product Maggi tested as "sub-standard" in

a district of Uttar Pradesh. Apart from the ₹45 lakh fine imposed on Nestle, the Shahjahanpur administration has also imposed a fine of ₹17 lakh on the six distributors of the company, making the total ₹62 lakh.



Indian Navy women out to circumnavigate globe are heroes, says Australian Minister: The all-woman crew of an Indian Navy sail boat was hailed as "heroes" by the State government of Vestern Australia for taking up an incredibly challenging expedition of

circumnavigating the globe. The six-member crew of the Indian Naval Sailing Vessel (INSV) Tarini, led by Lieutenant Commander Vartika Joshi, started their maiden voyage on September 10 from Goa and is expected to complete it in about eight months.
