THE POWER OF DETERMINATION

A true story about athlete Glenn Cunningham who was horribly burned in a schoolhouse fire at the age of 8. Doctors predicted he would never walk again. Determined to walk, Glenn would throw himself off his wheelchair and pull his body across the yard and along a fence. Twenty-two months later, he took his first steps and through sheer determination, learned to run despite the pain...

The little country schoolhouse was heated by an old-fashioned, pot-bellied coal stove. A little boy had the job of coming to school early each day to start the fire and warm the room before his teacher and his classmates arrived.

One morning they arrived to find the schoolhouse engulfed in flames. They dragged the unconscious little boy out of the flaming building more dead than alive. He had major burns over the lower half of his body and was taken to a nearby county hospital.

From his bed the dreadfully burned, semi-conscious little boy faintly heard the doctor talking to his mother. The doctor told his mother that her son would surely die – which was for the best, really – for the terrible fire had devastated the lower half of his body.

But the brave boy didn't want to die. He made up his mind that he would survive. Somehow, to the amazement of the physician, he did survive. When the mortal danger was past, he again heard the doctor and his mother speaking quietly. The mother was told that since the fire had destroyed so much flesh in the lower part of his body, it would almost be better if he had died, since he was doomed to be a lifetime cripple with no use at all of his lower limbs.

Once more the brave boy made up his mind. He would not be a cripple. He would walk. But unfortunately from the waist down, he had no motor ability. His thin legs just dangled there, all but lifeless.

Ultimately he was released from the hospital. Every day his mother would massage his little legs, but there was no feeling, no control, nothing. Yet his determination that he would walk was as strong as ever.

When he wasn't in bed, he was confined to a wheelchair. One sunny day his mother wheeled him out into the yard to get some fresh air. This day, instead of sitting there, he threw himself from the chair. He pulled himself across the grass, dragging his legs behind him.

He worked his way to the white picket fence bordering their lot. With great effort, he raised himself up on the fence. Then, stake by stake, he began dragging himself along the fence, resolved that he would walk. He started to do this every day until he wore a smooth path all around the yard beside the fence. There was nothing he wanted more than to develop life in those legs.

Ultimately through his daily massages, his iron persistence and his resolute determination, he did develop the ability to stand up, then to walk haltingly, then to walk by himself – and then – to run.

He began to walk to school, then to run to school, to run for the sheer joy of running. Later in college he made the track team.

Still later in Madison Square Garden this young man who was not expected to survive, who would surely never walk, who could never hope to run – this determined young man, Dr. Glenn Cunningham, ran the world's fastest mile**!, set records for the mile, by sophomore year, ran the 1,500-meter race at the 1932 Olympics and finished fourth, by senior year, set a world record for the mile of 4:06.8 and held seven of the top 13 fastest recorded times for the mile, earned a master's degree from University of lowa and a doctorate from New York University, during World War II, he served two years in the Navy and raised around 9,000 kids at the Glenn Cunningham Youth Ranch for troubled kids. 



LABOUR CAMP VISIT: an EXEMPLARY SOCIAL SERVICE TO THE LESS PRIVILEGED BY ICSK STUDENTS



"As you grow older, you will discover that you have two hands: One for helping yourself, the other for helping others." As a step forward in social responsibility, the Indian Community School (Senior) Kuwait, organized a visit to labour camps in Mahboula, Kuwait, on Friday, 24 November 2017.

The trip was an eye-opener to the teenagers who witnessed the tragic living situations of people who, separated from home and family & labour for their daily wage in disparate environments. In pursuit of survival, these workers are often ignored by society and are ostracized from societal concepts of family, love and community. The working conditions of these migrants are not very favourable, given the extremities of weather and manual labour involved. The workers are resultantly thrust into a world of darkness, exhaustion and seclusion. The students of ICSK Senior were welcomed into their solitary lives, to observe the other side of a wealthy coin and empathize with the lives of these fighters who



daily brave against the most harrowing.

Under the guidance and leadership of the class teachers various items like sugar, pulses, tea bags and blankets were collected class wise and kept in separate rooms. The students took initiative for collecting these and they were given five days for the same. 300 packets were made by the students which included 1kg of sugar, 5kgs of rice, 1 packet of dal, 1 packet of loose tea/tea bag & 1 blanket per packet. The neediest one among all the camps in Mahboula, Kuwait, is identified and students loaded the packets in to the buses and set forth to the labour camp



to distribute them accompanied by their teachers. The packets were handed over by the students individually to the needy.

The students delivered food, clothing, toiletries and other urgent inevitable needs, in an attempt to display solidarity with these workers and lighten their load in some ways. The smallest act of kindness is worth more than the grandest intention. Dr. Binumon, Principal, ICSK (Senior), commended the industrious effort of the students in packing and distributing food items, under the guidance of teachers. The students expressed their readiness in continuing this benevolent act of kindness. As per the request from the people of the camp the school has decided to increase the frequency of these visits. Charity is always another manifestation of love and it benefits the giver more than the receiver. Providing service and extending charity towards others helps us overcome our own difficulties and makes them seem less challenging. Initiatives like this from ICSK Senior has definitely helped the students evolve into better human beings with a mind set to "give rather than to receive" and will show the way to others to emulate their path towards compassion and empathy.

Nobel peace laureate ICAN urges nuclear powers to adopt ban-the-bomb treaty: The International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN) was awarded this year's Nobel Peace Prize by a Nobel committee that cited the spread of

nuclear weapons and the growing risk of an atomic war. The leader of the group that won this year's Nobel Peace Prize urged nuclear nations to adopt a United Nations treaty banning atomic weapons in order to prevent "the end of us".



Work to integrate Brahmos on 40 Sukhoi aircraft begins: Work has begun to integrate the Brahmos supersonic cruise missile on 40 Sukhoi combat aircraft which is expected to fulfil critical needs of the Indian Air Force in the wake of evolving

security dynamics in the region.



World's largest amphibious aircraft makes maiden flight in China: China's domestically developed AG600, the world's largest amphibious aircraft, performed its maiden flight from an airport on the shores of the South China Sea, the latest step in a

military modernisation programme.



Kashmir beckons adventure tourists: resh snowfall and the prospect of several weeks of sub-zero temperature have prompted the Jammu and Kashmir government to promote adventure tourismin the State. It has decided to introduce the

high adrenaline sport of ice climbing in Pahalgam, 100 km from Srinagar.



More channels to train teachers: With 13.6-lakh untrained teachers registering with the National Institute of Open Schooling to get trained by 2019 to retain their jobs, the Union government has chalked out a programme to roll out televised lectures in

regional languages and enable them to interact with experts in the studios during the lecture. The decision was taken at a review of the programme held by Union Human Resource Development Minister Prakash Javadekar.



Heritage spin for Naples' pizza: Naples' art of pizza twirling is a candidate to join UNESCO's list of "intangible heritage" next week along with a wealth of other cultural treasures such as Saudi Arabian wall painting and Bangladeshi cane weaving.



Kumi Naidoo is next Secretary General of Amnesty International: South African human rights activist Kumi Naidoo has been appointed as the next Secretary General of Amnesty International. He will take over from Indian activist Salil Shetty

in August 2018. Amnesty International is the largest human rights movement.



Facebook unveils chat app for children, with parental controls: Facebook is coming for your children. The social media giant is launching a messaging app for children to chat with their parents and with

friends approved by their parents. The free app is aimed at children under 13, who can't yet have their own accounts under Facebook's rules, though they often do.



Record-breaking nine-hour rainbow appears in Taiwan: A record-breaking nine-hour rainbow appeared in the Taiwanese capital of Taipei. professors at the Chinese Culture University efforts to document the

rainbow with the help of the department's students and the campus community. Their observations, pictures and video recordings showed the rainbow lasted for eight hours and 58 minutes.



Jammu and Kashmir govt. launches 'Saubhagya' scheme: The Jammu and Kashmir government has launched "Saubhagya" (Sahaj Bijli Har Ghar Yojna) with an aim to provide free electricity

connections to poor people in the State. Saubhagya, an initiative taken by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, seeks to provide electricity to 4 crore families across the country by December 2018.



Indian-American woman Aruna Miller to run for U.S. Congress: Indian-American politician Aruna Miller has filed nomination papers to run for the U.S. Congress from a Congressional seat in Maryland. Ms. Miller, 53, is currently a member of the Maryland

House of Delegates for which she first elected in 2010.



U.S. resumes DACA applications after judge blocks end to program: U.S. immigration authorities said that they will resume accepting requests under a program that shields young people brought to the United States illegally from deportation after

a court order blocked a government decision to end the program.



Om Prakash Rawat appointed new Chief Election Commissioner: The Union Law Ministry on appointed seniormost Election Commissioner Om Prakash Rawat as the next Chief Election Commissioner (CEC). Mr Rawat will have a tenure of almost a year

till his retirement in December 2018.


