

THE PLUS FACTOR & MARIGOLD PERSISTENCE

An Ohio housewife and mother named Alice Vonk once lived in a small town in a rich farming country, and she loved to plant things especially flowers. She had a little private custom that she always observed. Whenever she put a seed into the ground, she would murmur a little prayer. She figured that human beings could plant seeds, but it took God to make them grow.

One night Alice Vonk read in a seed catalogue about a prize being offered for a pure white marigold. She loved to grow marigolds herself, but they were always yellow or orange or rust colored. The seed company wanted a pure white marigold because that would enable them to develop hybrids of many colors through cross-pollination, and they were offering a prize of \$10,000.

Now, Alice Vonk, mother of eight, was no expert on the genetics of flowers, but she did know little about hybrids, and something inside her said, "Why not try it?" She was impelled into action by her Plus Factor.

So Alice Vonk started out with the largest yellow marigolds that she could find in the seed catalogue. As was her custom, she said a little prayer as she dropped each seed into the rich soil. Then she waited.

Finally, up came the marigolds, yellow as sunlight. Alice Vonk chose the palest ones, let them die naturally, gathered the seeds and planted them again next year. "Somewhere," she told her sceptical family, "is a pure white marigold and I am going to find it!" No discouragement there, you see; no doubts, no hint of failure. She is going to persist. She was going to persevere. No matter how long it might take.

And she did, year after year after year. Gradually her marigolds grew paler and paler, but none was pure white marigold she was seeking. Her children grew up, some married and moved away. Her husband died, and for a little while she was in grief. But then she took a deep breath and went back to marigolds. Her grandchildren were coming along, and they were eager to help. "Flowers and children are a lot alike," she said. "You have to understand them – and never give up on them."

For almost twenty years she kept on planting and praying, and persisting. And then, one morning she looked out of her garden and saw, in full glorious bloom, a pure white marigold! Not almost white Not nearly white. Pure white!

Alice Vonk send 100 seeds from this marigold to the seed company. There was a long wait while the seeds were tested. One day the president of the company called on the telephone. "Mrs Vonk," he said. 'I'm happy to tell you that you have won our prize!"

And indeed, she had.

What was the inner voice, that said to Mrs. Vonk, "Why not try"? What kept her going year after year when most people would have given up in discouragement. I can only believe it was the Plus Factor (God) at work. Does this unseen quality, the Plus Factor, activate and strengthen the capacity or persistence in a person, or does a display of perseverance in an individual call it forth? I think it probably works both ways. If you make a determined effort on your own, the Plus Factor will come to your aid. On the other hand, there seem to be times when the Plus Factor is manifested in a most unlikely way. It causes that person to choose an almost unattainable goal, and persist against almost insuperable odds until a hopeless hope becomes an actual reality. The Plus Factor is a reflection of eternal truth "If you have faith.....nothing shall be impossible unto you"

BOOKER PRIZE WINNER ARUNDHATI ROY



Man Booker Prize winner Arundhati Roy was born on November 24 in 1959. One of India's most celebrated authors and human rights activists, Roy was born in Shillong, Meghalaya. Her father was a Bengali Hindu and mother was a Keralite Christian, which made her observe different cultures closely and put them down in her writings.

We bring to you 11 amazing facts about Arundhati Roy that you should know:


- Her full name is Suzanna Arundhati Roy. She spent her childhood in Aymanam in Kerala, which has also been written about in her semi-autobiographical book The God of Small Things.
- 2. The God of Small Things won the Man Booker Prize in 1997. It was also on the list of the 'New York Times Notable Books

of the Year 1997'.

- Arundhati Roy and her first husband Gerard Da Cunha would sell cakes in Goa for a living. She did various odd jobs afterwards such as aerobics instructor and artist.
- 4. Roy also got into acting. Her second husband filmmaker Pradeep Kishen cast her for a minor role in the film Massey Saab. She later wrote for a television series on India's independence movement and on two films, Annie and Electric Moon.
- Before she wrote The God of Small Things, Roy would work on television dramas and movies. Roy won the National Film Award for Best Screenplay in 1988 for In Which Annie Gives It Those Ones.
- She came into prominence when she criticised Shekhar Kapur's blockbuster, The Bandit Queen, where she vehemently protested against the atrocities on women shown in the movie and its effect on the audience.
- When The God of Small Things came out, Arundhati was criticised for including the then Kerala Chief Minister E K Nayanar's description of sexuality. However, it is now

- a part of curriculum at various colleges and universities.
- 8. Roy has been involved in many social and environmental movements. For her outspoken propaganda on behalf of oppressed people, she has received the Lannan Cultural Freedom Award in 2002, the Sydney Peace Prize in 2004, and the Sahitya Akademi Award from the Indian Academy of Letters in 2006.
- 9. She is a spokesperson of the antiglobalisation or alternate globalisation movement and a critic of USA's foreign policy. She also criticised India's policies of nuclear deals and industrialisation, and has described it as "encrypted with genocidal potential".
- 10. She has also written against many government policies of India, Sri Lanka and US. She was recently criticised for calling Prime Minister Narendra Modi's nomination, 'a tragedy' and calling Modi the "most militaristic and aggressive" prime ministerial candidate.
- 11. She also returned her Sahitya Akademi Award in protest against recent cases of social and religious intolerance in India.

May 7 "Rabindranath Tagore Jayanti" - 156th Birth Anniversary of the Bard of Bengal



Rabindranath Tagore (7 May 1861- 7 August 1941) was a Bengali polymath who reshaped Bengali literature and music, as well as Indian art with contextual modernism. According to English calendar he was born on 7th May 1861 in Kolkata to parents Debendranath Tagore and Saradi Devi.

According to Bengali calendar he was born on 25th day of Boishakh month, in 1422 Bengali Era. In West Bengal Rabindranath Tagore anniversary is observed as per local Bengali calendar. In Kolkata Tagore Jayanti is popularly known as Poncheeshe Boishakh.

Author of Gitanjali and its "profoundly sensitive, fresh and beautiful

verse", he became the first non-European to win the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1913. Sometimes referred to as "the Bard of Bengal" Tagore's poetic songs were viewed as spiritual and mercurial; however, his "elegant prose and magical poetry" remain largely unknown outside Bengal.

Tagore wrote poetry as an eight-year-old. At the age of sixteen, he released his first substantial poems under the pseudonym Bhānusimha ("Sun Lion"). By 1877 he graduated to his first short stories and dramas, published under his real name. As a humanist, universalist internationalist, and ardent anti-nationalist, he denounced the British Raj and advocated independence from Britain. As an exponent of the Bengal Renaissance, he advanced a vast canon that comprised paintings, sketches and doodles, hundreds of texts, and some two thousand songs; his legacy endures also in the institution he founded, Visva-Bharati University.

Gitanjali (Song Offerings), Gora (Fair-Faced) and Ghare-Baire (The Home and the World) are his best-known works, and his verse, short stories, and novels were acclaimed—or panned—for their lyricism, colloquialism, naturalism, and unnatural contemplation. His compositions were chosen by two nations as national anthems: India's Jana Gana Mana and Bangladesh's Amar Shonar Bangla. The Sri Lankan national anthem was inspired by his work.

MEDICAL CAMP FOR STAFF - A BENEVOLENT GESTURE BY ICSK





"A healthy body hosts a healthy mind." With this maxim in mind, a Medical Camp was organized under the auspices of The Indian community School, Kuwait in association with the Indian Doctors Forum on 20th May 2017 at ICSK Senior, Salmiya. It was supported by Indian Dentists' Alliance in Kuwait (IDAK), Indian Nurses Association (INA), Kuwait Kerala Muslim Association (KKMA), Kuwait Kerala Muslim Cultural Center (KKMCC). The camp was attended by about 250 staff members and their families.

The main objective of this particular camp was to bring affordable healthcare and free health information to the staff and families of ICSK and identify their common health problems in order to devise ways of addressing them. Specifically, the Medical Camp sought to



provide health services to the community; provide both preventive and curative treatment for common conditions in the community; refer those who require specialized treatment to the relevant centers; create awareness and provide counselling on Diabetes, breast cancer and other ailments; create awareness on the need for personal hygiene in prevention of serious disabling diseases such as eye and dental, which are prevalent in the area .

The services that were provided at the medical camp were as follows: Height & weight check, BP & Blood sugar check, Cholesterol /CBC check, ECG, Ultrasound & vision testing. Medical specialties which were available at the Medical Camp included General Medicine, General Surgery, ENT, Dermatology, Cardiology, Orthopedics, Ophthalmology, Paediatrics, Gynaecology, Oncology, Neurology, Pulmonology, Endocrinology, Dental & Dietary Department.

Furthermore the medical camp provided opportunities to both medical and non medical personnel to give back to the community by way of volunteering their time, energy and expertise. Over 50 men and women including 25 doctors set aside their personal engagements and spent the whole day serving the needy in various capacities and it is because of the input of everybody who came out to help that the medical camp was a resounding success.





Kolkata (formerly Calcutta) is the capital of West Bengal state and the second largest city in India (after Mumbai). If we consider Bangalore as the Seattle of India, then Kolkata is the sub-contintent's London. Kolkata, 350-year-old metropolis, shocks you and charms you at the same time. Grandeur and poverty mix inexplicably with crumbling British Raj-era gems. Long known as the cultural capital of India, Kolkata continues to spawn generations of poets, writers, film producers and Nobel Prize winners. Kolkata is regarded as India's intellectual, artistic and cultural capital. It is an ideal place to experience the mild yet complex tang of Bengali cuisine. Whether you love it or hate it, you definitely won't forget the city on the Hooghly.

Calcutta flowered as the capital of British India [from 1772 - 1911]. Calcutta University, the first modern Indian university was founded here in 1857. Calcutta became the center of Indian arts and literature, and the national movement for Independence got its start here. Kolkata is a multicultural, cosmopolitan city.

Kolkata's urban area that includes the suburbs has a population of more than 14.3 million, makes it India's 3rd most populous metropolitan area. The city has a very high population density of 24,000 people per square kilometer. Bengali Hindus form the majority of Kolkata's population. Muslims, though a minority, constitute a large percentage of population; Christians, Jains, Sikhs, Buddhists are the other minority communities. We find very small communities

of Chinese, Nepalis, Anglo-Indians, Armenians, Greeks, Tibetans, Parsis, Jews, whose numbers declined during the 20th century. Bengali, the official state language, is the dominant language in Kolkata. English is also used, particularly by the white-collar workforce. Hindi and Urdu are spoken by a sizeable minority.

Mother Teresa was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for founding and working with the Missionaries of Charity in Kolkata—an organization "whose primary task was to love and care for those persons nobody was prepared to look after". Due to a book, written by Dominique Lapierre, on her work and life Kolkata is also known as 'City of Joy'.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Victoria Memorial is located on the plains at the banks of the River Hoogly and was completed in 1921. It is dedicated in the memory of Queen Victoria and is currently a museum. Lord Curzon commissioned the construction of this memorial and is built in a unique architectural blend of Mughal and British styles. The museum contains 25 galleries that house various antiquities and artifacts.

Howrah Bridge: The construction of the sixth longest cantilever bridge in the world, the Howrah Bridge is one of the most famous landmarks of Kolkata. The bridge is also called the Rabindra Setu after the famous Bengali literary figure and Nobel laureate Rabindranath Tagore.



The Indian Museum in Kolkata is the largest and the oldest museums in India and was established in 1814. The museum contains 6 sections which are further split in 35 galleries and contain a plethora of various antiquities, artifacts, paintings and mummies etc. The museum was established by a Dutch

botanist under the British, Dr. Nathaniel Wallich and is one of the oldest museums in the world.



The British in India gave the country its favorite sport Cricket. **Eden Gardens** are a massive capacity cricket ground and is often called a Cricket Colosseum. The Eden Gardens are the largest capacity cricket ground in the country and the 3rd largest in the world. The Stadium is one of the most iconic cricket grounds in India and is home to the Kolkata Knight Riders cricket club in the Indian Premier League.



Durga Puja is the biggest festivals of West Bengal and is celebrated with unparalleled enthusiasm in Kolkata. The festival symbolizes the homecoming of Goddess Durga for five days to her matrimonial home from Mount Kailash. It is a celebration of good over evil as the goddess vanquishes the demon Mahishasura. The preparations for the pandals and the idols start months in advance.



May 22 World Biodiversity Da



The International Day for Biological Diversity (or World Biodiversity Day) is a United Nations-sanctioned international day for the promotion of biodiversity issues. It is currently held on May 22.

The International Day for Biological Diversity falls within the scope of the UN Post-2015 Development Agenda's Sustainable Development Goals. In this larger initiative of international cooperation, the topic of biodiversity concerns stakeholders in sustainable agriculture; desertification, land degradation and drought; water and sanitation; health and sustainable development; energy; science, technology and innovation, knowledge-sharing and capacity-building; urban resilience and adaptation; sustainable transport; climate change and disaster risk reduction; oceans and seas; forests; vulnerable groups including indigenous peoples; and food security. The critical role of biodiversity in sustainable development was recognized in a document, "The World We Want: A Future for All".

Assembly in 1993 until 2000, it was held on December 29 to celebrate the day the Convention on Biological Diversity went into effect. On December 20, 2000, the date was shifted to commemorate the adoption of the Convention on May 22, 1992 at the Rio Earth Summit.

Coinciding with the observance of International Day for Biological Diversity, on May 2011 Indonesian Forestry Ministry inaugurated the Ciwalen Canopy Trail that is 120 meters long and 60 meters wide at an elevation of 30-40 meters above the ground at Gunung Gede Pangrango National Park, West Java to accommodate 5 to 10 people in one trip.

The 2014 theme of Island Biodiversity was chosen because islands provide a rich source of biodiversity for plants, animals, fish and forestry products.

HOW WOULD THE NIGHT SKY LOOK IF OTHER PLANETS WOULD BE AS CLOSE AS THE SUN



The night sky always fascinates me. I love to spend hours on my Celestron telescope trying to locate the different stars and planets, and watching them totally mesmerised. I track the celestial movements on different sites and try to find the best times when we can view them best. I was totally in awe of planet Saturn when I saw it in all its splendor with its rings for the first time. It's not always easy to imagine just how big the other planets are. And then I came across an article where a space artist's thought experiment turns into a lesson in Earth's relative size. How can anyone understand a planet that is more than 1,300 times the size of our own? Our intuitive sense of sizes, distances, and time are of little help when it comes to space.

Space artist Ron Miller has created a series of images that illustrate the sizes of the other planets in our solar system in a way that makes them a bit more accessible, showing what they would look like if they were 240,000 miles away -- the approximate distance of the moon from the Earth. Here are some of his images.



This is what Jupiter would look like if it was our close neighbor. No offense to our moon, but imagine looking up in the sky and seeing this beautiful Saturn or the bright azure blue Neptune.

Miller thinks that the night sky shapes who we are, and having a huge other planet so large would change us. "We would all feel a lot more humble with Jupiter's presence constantly looking over us," he told The Daily Mail. And I think I couldn't agree more....



Hacking is unauthorized intrusion into a computer or a network. The person engaged in hacking activities is generally referred to as a hacker.

There are mainly three types of skilled Hackers; they are White hat, Black hat and Grey hat.

Researchers at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL), the foremost lab of NASA for work on interplanetary travel, discovered the new bacteria on the filters of the International Space Station (ISS) and named it Solibacillus kalamii to honour the late President, who was a renowned aerospace scientist.



Heena Sidhu bags air pistol bronze: Heena Sidhu won the air pistol bronze at the 48th Grand Prix of Liberation international shooting competition. In women's 50m rifle prone, a non-Olympic event without a final, Tejaswini Sawant

took silver. Pemba Tamang finished third in the men's 25-metre centre-fire pistol, also a non-Olympic event.



CBSE declares 2017 class XII results:

Raksha Gopal tops with 99.6%:The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) released the 2017 class 12 Board examination results. Raksha Gopal from Noida, has

topped with 99.6 per cent marks. The pass per cent in the CBSE Class XII exam has fallen to 82 per cent from 83.05 per cent last year.



Women to get combat role in Army: In a transformational move, the Indian Army is all set to open up combat positions for women, a gender barrier broken by only a few countries. Women are now allowed in a number of select areas including in medical, legal, educational, signals and engineering wings of the Army but combat roles are off limits for them due to operational concerns and logistical issues. The Army Chief Gen. Bipin Rawat said he was ready to recruit women as jawans and the matter is being taken up with the government.



Railways to track wagons, coaches with RFID tags: The Indian Railways will use radio-frequency identification tags (RFID) for tracking of wagons, coaches and locomotives to ensure effective and

transparent functioning. Railways have sanctioned Rs 57 crore for the first phase of rollout of the system. The tag designed by the Centre for Railway Information System (CRIS) is estimated to cost Rs 1000 per tag.



H-1B visa effect: Infosys to hire 10,000 American workers: Infosys, among India's largest software services companies, said it plans to hire 10,000 American workers over the next two years. As part of this initiative,

Infosys will open four new technology and innovation hubs across the country.



AICTE to facilitate internships for students: The All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) has signed an agreement with Internshala, an internship and training platform, to facilitate internships for Indian

students.As per the MoU, all colleges affiliated to the AICTE - the regulatory body for technical education under the Ministry for Human Resource Development - will now be able to help their students find internships through Internshala free of cost.



Cyclone Mora wreaks havoc in coastal Bangladesh: Cyclone Mora that lashed Bangladesh's coastlines forcing the evacuation of millions of people and shutting the country's main port and river

transport. The cyclone, which lashed the coastal belt with a wind speed of 128 kmph and made landfall at around 6 a.m., cut off Kutubdia, Moheshkhali and Teknaf from other parts of the country.



New one rupee notes to be in circulation soon: New one rupee notes with predominantly pink and green on obverse and reverse in combination with other colours will be soon put into circulation. The

notes bearing the rupee symbol have been printed by the Government of India. At present, one rupee coins are minted. Printing of one rupee notes was discontinued in 1994 but was relaunched in 2015.



Brazil declares end to Zika emergency:


Brazil has declared an end to its public health emergency for the Zika virus, 18 months after a surge in cases drew headlines around the world. The mosquito-borne virus wasn't considered a

major health threat until the 2015 outbreak revealed that Zika could lead to severe birth defects. One of those defects, microcephaly, causes babies to be born with skulls much smaller than expected.
