

QUETZALS

Several kinds of beautifully coloured birds of the Americas are called quetzals. The best known of these is the resplendent quetzal. The tail feathers of the male resplendent quetzal are about twice as long as the rest of the bird. The resplendent quetzal was held sacred by the ancient Aztec and Maya peoples. Today it is the national emblem of Guatemala.



Quetzals live in the warm parts of South America and Central America. The resplendent guetzal ranges from southern Mexico to Panama. This bird lives in the heavy tropical highland rain forests of the region. Some quetzals have been found in rain forests at heights of up to 10,000 feet (3,000 meters).

A quetzal's body is about 14 inches (36 centimetres) long. The tail feathers can add well over 2 feet (61 centimetres) to the male's total length. The feathers hang straight down when the bird is at rest. In addition to the tail, the male also has a crest of short feathers on its head to set it apart from the female. A quetzal's beak is curved, broad, and short, with tiny bristles at the base. The legs are short and the feet are weak.

The feathers of a resplendent quetzal are mostly green. The lower belly of the male is reddish. The female has a grey belly and is generally duller in colour than the male. The green or blue-green tail has under parts that are white in the male and black and white in the female.

Quetzals are more often heard than seen. They make a soft, rather sad cooing sound. They are usually found alone, sitting motionless on a tree branch. Quetzals do not fly long distances. Adults feed mainly on fruit. They snatch the fruit off the stems of trees while in flight and then eat while perching on a nearby branch.

Quetzals nest in holes in trees, high above the forest floor. The female lays light blue eggs, usually two at a time. The male helps tend the eggs. The eggs hatch after about 18 days. Both parents feed the fledglings insects and lizards.

Only the Aztec nobility were allowed to wear quetzal feathers. It is believed that the Aztecs snipped the feathers from the tails of living birds. In more recent times, however, hunters have killed quetzals for their feathers. An even bigger threat to the birds is the destruction of the forests where they live. Some countries have banned hunting of quetzals and protect the birds in national parks or reserves.

Russian Gas Supplies to China Soar By 60% In 2022:



Amid the ongoing war in Ukraine, Russia's gas supplies to China have soared by as much as 60 per cent in the first four months of 2022 compared to the same period last year. The energy standoff between Russia and the West has led to gas supplies to countries outside the former Soviet Union dropping by 26.9 per cent since the start of the year. Russian President Vladimir Putin had earlier ordered gas payments from "unfriendly countries," which include the European Union (EU), to be made in rubles

Stanley's German branch Morgan searched by prosecutors in relation to tax fraud scandal:



The German branch of Morgan Stanley was searched by prosecutors in Frankfurt in relation to "past activity". Prosecutors said the search was being conducted in particular to collect relevant emails and written correspondence. This scandal is Germany's biggest post-war fraud involving a share-trading scheme that the authorities say cost taxpayers billions of euros. A large number of banks were involved in the cum-ex deals: there have been raids on the German branches of Barclays and the investment bank Merrill Lynch.

Pandya will provide a wealth of options to the team, says Irfan Pathan

Former India cricketer Irfan Pathan feels that all-rounder Hardik Pandya will provide the team management with a wealth of options against South Africa. A fully fit Pandya makes his return to the squad in a five-match T201 series against South Africa. The talented all-rounder enjoyed an excellent IPL season with the bat, scoring 487 runs in 15 matches. His spell of 3/17 in the IPL final was a matchwinning performance. "Hardik Pandya is very valuable and he is capable of finishing the game. He can do that, batting from the top as well. So, the management is quite aware of this and having him in the team, they don t just have one or two but three finishers in the team. The way Hardik Pandya bats, he is capable of scoring sixes anytime and has started playing along the ground too, which is why this season in the IPL, he has been great. Getting back to batting, the Indian team, having three finishers, has filled up the gaps and having him back in the team excites me a lot,»

A community lunch in Karnataka to send message of social harmony

Sending a loud and clear message of social harmony at a time when the state is witnessing clashes over communal issues, a community lunch (Pankti Bhojana) was organised at a crematorium near foothills of the Chamundi Hills on Wednesday which was attended by leaders from all communities. Inaugurating the community lunch, writer Aravinda Malagatti said that to establish equality and social harmony, there is a need to reunite Dravidian power and movement. He said, "Throughout history, we can find the fear and insecurity among the Aryans which made them avail power using techniques and dividing the people in the name of food, caste and profession. There are over 85 Dravidian languages of which only 25 are in use... there is a need for Dravidian movement here similar to what Periyar did in Tamil Nadu."

Train quard's daughter only Muslim woman in Karnataka to clear UPSC

Monday was a momentous day in the history of the school run by the South Western Railway Women's Welfare Organisation (SWRWWO) in Hubballi. It held a mega felicitation function for its only student in its 32-year-old history who cracked the Civil Services Exam in the results announced a week ago. What makes it all the more remarkable is that Tahseen Banu Dawadi,

the only Muslim woman to clear the exams out of 26 in the State, is the daughter of a retired goods train guard. Dawadi secured 482nd rank in her second attempt.

Khadar Basha, who retired from Railways as a chief trains clerk in 2012, told TNIE, "I was very happy when the results were out. I was confident she would clear it. My two sons and two daughters are all good in academics. It was a proud moment for me when the General Manager, SWR and the Divisional Railway Manager, Hubballi invited us to their office and honored my daughter."

Nothing plastic about this village Pradhan's mission

The 29-year-old gram pradhan (village head) of Rajpur village in Hathras district of Uttar Pradesh is far from traditional village heads in this northern part of the country. In fact, the village head defies many a notion held about village heads. Rajasthan-born and Delhi-bred Priyanka Tiwari, 29, a Mass Communication graduate, has set an example by bringing about a holistic change in the village and in the psyche of villagers towards environmental conservation after donning the mantle of gram pradhan in 2021. Born in Jodhpur of Rajasthan to an army man, Priyanka came to Rajpur village after marriage in 2019. Hardly accustomed to village life, lack of amenities, mounds of garbage, dilapidated roads, open and blocked drains, and improper waste management used to unnerve her during her visits to Rajpur from Delhi where her husband runs a business. Her every visit would force her to think of making the village life better through a correction in functionalities.

As a village head, she had her agenda fixed. She took up the task of ridding the village of plastic. "It was not possible to stop plastic use in a day. I was sure that it would be a long process," said Priyanka. In order to effectively implement her plan, Priyanka primarily got cloth bags distributed among shopkeepers, roadside vendors, and houses. Secondly, her panchayat decided to impose a fine of `500 for first-time violators of the ban on plastic, `1,000 for secondtime flouters and repeating for the third time, the licence of the violating shop would be cancelled.

What are the Best Locations in India for Stargazing?






Devi is sure to make the experience more memorable.

Payal Kadakia: - Founder of ClassPass



Instead of thinking of herself as an entrepreneur, Payal Kadakia describes herself as "a problem solver." Nevertheless, her solution's scope makes her a latterday hero — and a noteworthy one at that as the founder of ClassPass. As of June 2018, ClassPass, a digital service that gives customers access to several health and wellness studios via one subscription, was valued at \$610 million. The 36-year-old skilled dancer found tremendous success as a result of her venture. Her aspirations don't end there either.

Her Childhood: -

At the age of three, she started training in Indian traditional dance. Kadakia and a few other young Indian girls formed a close-knit group and practiced together in family basements thanks to a family member who had been a dance teacher in India. Her youth was marked by weekend trips to contests


where she competed in dance. Dance and movement gave her a flexible and eventually powerful connection with cultures as she grew up in Western society.

A Lucrative Career: -

She returned to San Francisco few months later. There, she met entrepreneurs who were disrupting different sectors with technology, and she was intrigued by the concept. She was taking ballet lessons at the time and looking into a new class to try. The more she looked, the more irritated she became since every website she tried was already taken. Kadakia did locate one available place in the program, but she was so dissatisfied by this time that she decided not to go.

It dawned on her, as it had with other entrepreneurs she'd spoken to, that technology might be an excellent vehicle for her concept as well: to help individuals take

the step toward a better and more meaningful existence.

found courses. A few acquaintances volunteered to invest in her nascent company after hearing about her concept. She finally made the leap of faith. When she came up with the concept for ClassPass, she worked full-time for six months before quitting with the permission of her parents. After discussing her earnings with her father, Kadakia became motivated to find a solution for this logistical problem and make people's lives more efficient. Her company, ClassPass, was established in 2011 by her.

ClassPass is a fitness class subscription service that charges a single monthly price for a variety of fitness courses, rather than charging different rates for each kind of session. In the locations where it operates, its network gives users access to a wide range of workshops, gyms, and meditation courses. As Kadakia and her colleagues look to the future, they are considering expanding the ClassPass platform to include every service or hobby that helps people live better lifestyles, such as culinary courses or even beauty services.

EPITOME OF SUCCESS SHAKUNTALA DEVI



Shakuntala Devi, an Indian writer, astrologer and mathematical genius, popularly known as "The Human Computer", was born on 4th November 1929.

Born into a Hindu Brahmin family in Bangalore as the daughter of a circus performer, she started displaying her skills at an early age. Her father recognized her as a child prodigy when she was 3 and took her on road shows where she displayed her ability at calculation. What was really amazing about the young girl's mathematical prowess was that she did not receive any formal education and yet emerged to be one of the most brilliant mathematical minds of her time. Her phenomenal ability to perform complicated mathematical calculations without the aid of any device gained her much fame and she eventually became an international phenomenon.

In 1950, Shakuntala Devi toured Europe to demonstrate her arithmetic skills. In 1977,

at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, where she extracted the 23rd root of a 201-digit number in 50 seconds. It took a Univac computer 62 seconds to do the same.

Her talents earned her a place in the Guinness Book of World Records in the year 1982. She was praised as the authentic heroine of her times and she could command the headlines in newspapers and magazines. It was said she could out-perform the fastest computers of her times.

Shakuntala Devi married Paritosh Banerji, who worked in India civil service in mid-19-60s. The couple had a daughter and divorced in a few years.

In 1980, she contested the Lok Sabha elections against Indira Gandhi but lost. In addition to her work as a mental calculator, Devi was a notable astrologer and an author of several books, including cookbooks and

novels. She started with writing short stories and murder mysteries, and had a keen interest in music.



Notably, the first woman mathematician in India,

Shakuntala Devi died in Bangalore on 21 April 2013 at the age of 83 due to cardiac and respiratory problems.

However, her legacy remains. Shakuntala Devi is a 2020 Indian Hindi- language biographical drama film tracing her life. The film stars Vidya Balan in a titular role as Shakuntala Devi, along with Sanya Malhotra, Amit Sadh and Jisshu Sengupta in supporting roles. The movie is rated 80% by rotten tomatoes and is worth a watch for a deep insight into her life.

M. A. Muthiah Chettiar



Raja Sir Muttaiya Annamalai Muthiah Chettiar was an Indian banker, politician, philanthropist, socialite and cultural activist who served as Mayor of Madras city and Minister of Excise and Education in the provincial government of Madras Presidency. He was holder of the hereditary title Kumar-rajah and later, Raja of Chettinad. The Indian government honoured him with a postal stamp issued on his memory on 21 December 1987.


Ritwik Ghatak



Ritwik Kumar Ghatak was a noted Indian film director, screenwriter, and playwright. Along with prominent contemporary Bengali filmmakers Satyajit Ray, Tapan Sinha and Mrinal Sen, his cinema is primarily remembered for its meticulous depiction of social reality, partition and feminism. He won the National Film Award's Rajat Kamal Award for Best Story in 1974 for his Jukti Takko Aar Gappo and Best Director's Award from Bangladesh Cine Journalist's Association for Titash Ekti Nadir Naam. The Government of India honoured him with the Padma Shri for Arts in 1970. A stamp was issued for him on 31 December 2007.

Mangal Pandey

Mangal Pandey was an Indian soldier who played a key part in the events immediately preceding the outbreak of the Indian rebellion of 1857. He was a sepoy (infantryman) in the



34th Bengal Native Infantry (BNI) regiment of the British East India Company. His life and actions have also been portrayed several cinematic productions. In 1984, the Indian government issued

postage stamp to remember him.

Arjan Singh



Marshal of the Indian Air Force Arjan Singh, was a senior air officer of the Indian Air Force. He served as the 3rd Chief of the Air Staff from 1964 to 1969, leading the Air Force through the Indo-Pakistani War of 1965. He was the first and only officer of the Indian Air Force (IAF) to be promoted to five-star rank as Marshal of the Indian Air Force, equal to the army rank of Field Marshal. The Indian government released a stamp on October 9 2019 to commemorate Arjan Singh.

M. S. Subbulakshmi

Madurai Shanmukhavadivu Subbulakshmi was an Indian Carnatic singer from Madurai, Tamil Nadu. She was the first musician ever to be awarded the Bharat Ratna, India's highest civilian honour. She is the first Indian musician to receive the Ramon Magsaysay award in 1974 with the citation reading "Exacting purists acknowledge Srimati M. S. Subbulakshmi as the leading exponent of classical and semi-classical songs in the carnatic tradition of South India. She was the First Indian who performed in United Nations

General Assembly in 1966."
A commemorative postage stamp on her was issued on 18 December 2005. United Nations decided to issue stamp to mark birth centenary M.S. Subbulakshmi.

Thomas Stanley Holland is and English actor. His career began at the age of nine when he enrolled in a dancing class, where a choreographer noticed him and arranged for him to audition for a role in Billy Elliot the Musical at London's Victoria Palace Theatre. After two years of training, he secured a supporting part in 2008 and was upgraded to the title role that year, which he played until 2010.

Holland made his film debut in the disaster drama The Impossible (2012) as a teenage tourist trapped in a tsunami, for which he received a London Film Critics Circle Award for Young British Performer of the Year. After this, Holland decided to pursue acting as a full-time career, appearing in How I Live Now (2013) and playing historical figures in the film In the Heart of the Sea (2015) and the mini series Wolf Hall (2015).

At the 70th British Academy Film Awards in 2017, Holland won the Rising Star Award. Holland's first work that year was alongside Charlie Hunnam in James Gray's drama The Lost City of Z, which was released to positive reviews. Neil Soans of The Times of India

praised Holland for making the film emotional towards the end and Rex Reed of The New York Observer found him "remarkably strong and self-assured".

Hollands's second project in 2017 was his solo feature as the title character in Spider-Man: Homecoming. As a result, Holland earned an entry in Guinness Book of World Records as the youngest actor to play a title role in the MCU.

Ben Travis of Empire magazine wrote "Holland never loses the ebullient spark that makes him one of the MCU's most endearing figures". Holland received a third consecutive Saturn Award for Best Performance by a Younger Actor for Far From Home, having previously won for Civil War and Homecoming.

He voiced roles in the Blue Sky Studios animation Spies in Disguise (2019), the live-action film Dolittle (2019), and the Pixar animated film Onward (2020). Alongside Avengers co-star Sebastian Stan, Tom Holland starred in Antonio Campos's The Devil All The Time (2020), a Netflix

psychological thriller set after World War II. He also starred in Cherry a crime drama which is based on the namesake novel by American author Nico Walker, and reunited him with Avengers directors Russo Brothers.

When The Brothers Trust first began, the Holland family focused on helping to raise money for more local charities such as Momentum. To eliminate poverty in the world, The Brothers Trust has assisted in raising money for The Lunchbowl Network since their partnership in 2016. To further reduce poverty, The Brothers Trust supports Artists for Africa.

In conclusion, Tom Holland at the young age of 26 years, has achieved wonders with his amazing talents and work ethics. As it turns out, Holland may have outdone many other actors in terms of the niceness department.

According to a senior ISRO official, a human-rated spacecraft should be able to accommodate the crew as if they are living in normal acceptable conditions and they should be able to perform various activities during their stay.



India to introduce "made in India" skin test for TB: India will introduce a newly approved "made in India" TB infection skin test called 'c-TB', said Health Minister Mansukh Mandaviya, adding that this cost-effective tool will be of immense benefit to other high

burden countries as well. He also informed that a new initiative, "Adopt people with TB" will be launched this year, based on Indian values of collectivism, which will call upon corporates, industries, organisations, political parties and individuals to come forward and adopt TB-infected people and family and provide them with nutritional and social support.



In a first, White House officials meet documented 'dreamers': For the first time, White House officials met a representative group of documented 'dreamers', mostly Indian-Americans, giving a patient hearing to their concerns

regarding aging out and indicating that there may be positive moves so that they don't have to leave the country where they have spent almost their entire live. The so-called documented dreamers, who are estimated to be about 250,000, grew up legally in the US but risk deportation when they turn 21.

development of 5G, or fifth-generation,

The US has long pressed Trudeau's government to deny Huawei a role in building the country's 5G infrastructure, saying it would allow Beijing to spy on Canadians more easily.



Macron names first French female PM in three decades: President Emmanuel Macron on Monday, May 16, 2022, named Labour Minister Elisabeth Borne as Prime Minister to lead his ambitious reform plans, the first woman to head the French government in over


